### **Executive summary**

Following completion of our interim internal audit on 5 October 2021 and final audit on 20 April 2022, we enclose our report for your kind attention and presentation to the council. The audit was conducted in accordance with current practices and guidelines and testing was risk based. Whilst we have not tested all transactions, our samples have where appropriate covered the entire year to date. Testing requirements are shown in red and where appropriate recommendations for future action are shown in bold text and summarised in the tables at the end of the report.

Our report is presented in the same order as the assertions on the internal auditor report within the published AGAR. The start of each section details the nature of the assertion to be verified, followed by recommended minimum testing requirements. Each section is then concluded with an opinion as to whether the assertion has been met or not.

Our sample testing did not uncover any errors or misstatements that require reporting to the external auditor, nor did we identify any significant weaknesses in the internal controls such that public money would be put at risk.

It is clear the council takes governance, policies and procedures very seriously and I am pleased to report that overall, the systems and procedures you have in place are fit for purpose and whilst my report may contain recommendations to change these are not indicative of any significant failings, but rather are pointers to improving upon an already well-ordered system.

It is therefore our opinion that the systems and internal procedures at Bury Parish Council are well established and followed.

### Regulation

The Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 require smaller authorities, each financial year, to conduct a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control and prepare an annual governance statement in accordance with proper practices in relation to accounts. In addition to this, a smaller authority is required by Regulation 5(1) of the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 to "undertake an effective internal audit to evaluate the effectiveness of its risk management, control and governance processes, taking into account public sector internal auditing standards or guidance."

Internal auditing is an independent, objective assurance activity designed to improve an organisation's operations. It helps an organisation accomplish its objectives by bringing a systematic, disciplined approach to evaluate and improve the effectiveness of risk management, control and governance processes. The purpose of internal audit is to review and report to the authority on whether its systems of financial and other internal controls over its activities and operating procedures are effective.

Internal audit's function is to test and report to the authority on whether its specific system of internal control is adequate and working satisfactorily. The internal audit reports should therefore be made available to all members to support and inform them when they considering the authority's approval of the annual governance statement.

## Independence and competence

Your audit was conducted by Andy Beams of Mulberry & Co. We confirm we are independent from the management of the financial controls and procedures of the council and neither the internal auditor or the firm have any conflicts of interest with the audit client, nor do they provide any management or financial assistance to the client.

Your auditor has over 30 years' experience in the financial sector with the last 12 years specialising in local government.

### **Engagement Letter**

An engagement letter was issued to the council covering the 2021/22 internal audit assignment. Copies of this document are available on request.

### Planning and inherent risk assessment

The scope and plan of works including fee structure was issued to the council under separate cover. Copies of this document are available on request. In summary, our work will address each of the internal control objectives as stated on the Annual Internal Audit Report of the AGAR.

- O There have been no instances of breaches of regulations in the past
- The client uses an industry approved financial reporting package
- The client regularly carries out reconciliations and documents these
- o There is regular reporting to council
- o The management team are experienced and informed
- Records are neatly maintained and referenced
- The client is aware of current regulations and practices
- There has been no instance of high staff turnover

At the interim audit date, it is my opinion that the inherent risk of error or misstatement is low, and the controls of the council can be relied upon and as such substantive testing of individual transactions is not required. Testing to be carried out will be "walk through testing" on sample data to encompass the period of the council year under review.

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### A. BOOKS OF ACCOUNT (INTERIM AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

Appropriate accounting records have been properly kept throughout the financial year.

### **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Ensure the correct roll forward of the prior year cashbook balances to the new financial year
- Check a sample of financial transactions in cashbooks to bank statements, etc.: the sample size dependent on the size of the authority and nature of accounting records maintained

### Interim audit

The council uses the Rialtas Business Solutions (RBS) accounting system for recording the day-to-day financial transactions of the council. The system is used regularly and provides detailed information for review by Members. This is a tried and tested industry specific package, and I make no recommendation to change.

The interim audit was conducted remotely, and the Clerk provided a link to shared files with the requested information and advised of relevant minutes for review. Where the website was viewed to check information, I found this to be logically laid out and easy to navigate.

Meeting agendas are logically structured and minutes show clear resolutions being made by committee and council. I make no recommendation to change this system.

The council is not VAT registered and completes reclaims via a VAT 126 claim form. The last VAT reclaim was for the period 1 April to 30 September 2021 inclusive and showed a refund position of £1,083.73. The council is up to date with its postings.

#### **Final Audit**

The final audit was conducted remotely, and the Clerk provided all the requested information in advance of the audit date. We discussed any questions over the telephone and my report was updated based on these findings.

Overall, I have the impression that the accounting systems are well ordered and routinely maintained and as such I make no recommendation to change.

## **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control assertion of "Appropriate accounting records have been properly kept throughout the financial year" has been met.

## B. FINANCIAL REGULATIONS, GOVERNANCE AND PAYMENTS (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

This authority complied with its financial regulations, payments were supported by invoices, all expenditure was approved, and VAT was appropriately accounted for.

# **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Review the procedures in place for acquisition of formal tenders and quotes, ensuring they are in line with the Standing Orders and Financial Regulations which should be based on the latest version.
- Ensure that consistent values are in place for the acquisition of formal tenders between Standing Orders and Financial Regulations (frequently different limits are recorded in the two documents)
- Review the procedures for receipt of invoices, agreement of invoice detail and confirmation of goods /services delivery
  and approval for payment: ideally, a suitably designed certification stamp should be in place providing for evidencing of
  these checks and payment authorisation
- Check that there is effective segregation between the writing of cheques or the setting up of online payments, and physical release of payments
- Check that VAT reclaims are prepared and submitted in a timely manner in line with the underlying records and in accordance with current HMRC requirements

• Where debit / credit cards are in use, establish the total monthly and individual transaction limits and ensure appropriate controls over physical security and usage of the cards are in place

#### Interim audit

### Check the publication and minuting of the prior year audited AGAR and notice of conclusion of audit.

The external auditor's report was qualified for 2020/21 due to an error in the notice of elector's rights. This was received at the end of September and is due to be reported to council at the next meeting scheduled for November. The Clerk is advised to publish the external auditor's report and Notice of Conclusion of Audit on the website as soon as possible – this does not have to wait until after reporting to council.

## Confirm by sample testing that councillors sign statutory office forms

The council website includes details of each member with a short bio and their Declaration of Interests form.

# Confirm that the council is compliant with the relevant transparency code

The council's income and expenditure are between £25,000 and £200,000 per annum, and it is therefore not required by law to follow the Local Government Transparency Code, although it is recommended to do so. A review of the council website shows that the council is publishing some of the information contained within the code.

## Confirm that the council is compliant with GDPR

The council is fully aware of GDPR and has undergone training. It was noted the council has established common email addresses for all councillors. This is recommended because it gives a natural segregation between work and personal lives, making it clear beyond doubt in what capacity a councillor is acting. In addition to this it gives control to the council, adds a degree of professionalism and in the event of a FOI request limits access to personal computers.

The council has a Privacy Notice on the home page of its website. It is clear the council takes its responsibilities seriously and has made every effort to comply with the legislation.

# Confirm that the council meets regularly throughout the year

In addition to full council, the council has a committees for Environment and Planning. A diary of events, including forthcoming meetings, is available on the home page of the council website, and committee agendas and minutes are also published.

## Check that agendas for meetings are published giving 3 clear days' notice.

The Clerk was able to demonstrate that at least 3 clear days' notice is given on agendas. Whilst we have not tested every single committee and council meeting there was no evidence of non-compliance in giving three clear days' notice of the meeting. I remind council it is required to also post any supporting documentation with the agendas as outlined by the Information Commissioner's Office (page 3 of this link) <a href="ico.org.uk/minutesandagendas.pdf">ico.org.uk/minutesandagendas.pdf</a>

# Check the draft minutes of the last meeting(s) are on the council's website

Draft minutes are uploaded to the council website and clearly marked as draft. These are subsequently replaced with final versions once approved.

# Confirm that the Parish Council's Standing Orders have been reviewed within the last 12 months.

The standing orders are based on the most recent NALC model and were most recently reviewed and adopted by council in November 2020. The Clerk confirmed these will be reviewed again at the council meeting in November 2021.

# Confirm that the Parish Council has adopted and recently reviewed Financial Regulations.

Financial regulations are based on the latest NALC model and were most recently reviewed and adopted by council in November 2020 (minute ref 15(a)). The regulations contain provisions for the approval of spending, setting of budgets, reconciliation of the bank and reporting to council. The Clerk confirmed that the Financial Regulations will be reviewed again at the council meeting in November 2021.

### Check that the council's Financial Regulations are being routinely followed.

The council has thresholds in place at which authorisations to spend must be obtained as per FR 4.1:

- 4.1 Expenditure on revenue items may be authorised up to the amounts included for that class of expenditure in the approved budget. This authority is to be determined by:
- the full council for all items over £1,000
- the Clerk for any items between £500 and £1,000 with consent from the Chairman
- the Clerk for any items up to £500.

These thresholds seem appropriate for a council of this size, and I found no evidence of them being breached during my interim audit. A review of council minutes shows that payments are authorised in accordance with Financial Regulations.

Confirm all section 137 expenditure meets the guidelines and does not exceed the annual per elector limit of £8.41 per elector. The receipts and payments listing shows no s.137 expenditure to date. There is an allocated budget of £500 which is within thresholds.

# Confirm that checks of the accounts are made by a councillor.

The system noted above details internal review takes place and I am under no doubt that council properly approves expenditure.

### **Final Audit**

I noted that the Notice of Conclusion and External Auditor Report were published on the council website a few days after the interim visit. The External Auditor's Report highlighted errors with the sequence of AGAR sign-off and the completion of the correct period for the Elector's Rights.

Council is reminded that it is required to also post any supporting documentation with the agendas as outlined by the Information Commissioner's Office (page 3 of this link) ico.org.uk/minutesandagendas.pdf. This was highlighted in the interim audit visit, and I can see no evidence of action being taken since to correct this oversight.

## **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control assertion "This authority complied with its financial regulations, payments were supported by invoices, all expenditure was approved, and VAT was appropriately accounted for" has been met.

# C. RISK MANAGEMENT AND INSURANCE (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)

## Internal audit requirement

This authority assessed the significant risks to achieving its objectives and reviewed the adequacy of arrangements to manage these.

## **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Ensure that authorities have prepared, and formally adopted, at least once annually, an appropriate and comprehensive register of assessed risks, both regular and ad hoc
- Ensure that appropriate levels of insurance cover are in place for land, buildings, public, employers' and hirers' (where applicable) liability, fidelity / employees (including councillors) liability, business interruption and cyber security
- Ensure that appropriate arrangements are in place for monitoring play areas, open spaces and sports pitches: such reviews should be undertaken by appropriately qualified external inspectors or, if by officers or members, that they have received the appropriate training and accreditation

## Interim audit

The council has a risk assessment process in place, which was last reviewed and agreed by council in September 2020. It is scheduled for further review at the scheduled meeting in November 2021.

The risk assessment details the type of risks identified, the control measures in place, an assessment of the likelihood and severity of the risk level, and any further action required. The assessment covers financial, operational and other risks and is entirely suitable for a council of this size. The level of detail suggests that the council takes risk assessment seriously and addresses any issues identified in a effective manner.

I confirmed that the council has a valid insurance policy in place with AXA. This is a 3-year long-term agreement expiring on 19 March 2021. The policy includes Public Liability and Employers Liability cover of £10 million each and an Employee Dishonesty (Fidelity Guarantee) level of £150,000. These levels appear appropriate for a council of this size.

#### Final audit

We discussed assertion 8 on the AGAR and whether or not this had any impact on the council.

"We considered whether any litigation, liabilities or commitments, events or transactions, occurring either during or after the year-end, have a financial impact on this authority and, where appropriate, have included them in the accounting statements."

The Clerk was able to confirm there were no matters excluded from the accounting statements.

### **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control objective of "This authority assessed the significant risks to achieving its objectives and reviewed the adequacy of arrangements to manage these" has been met.

### D. BUDGET, PRECEPT AND RESERVES (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

The precept or rates requirement resulted from an adequate budgetary process; progress against the budget was regularly monitored; and reserves were appropriate.

# **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Ensure that the full authority, not a committee, has considered, approved and adopted the annual precept in accordance with the required parent authority timetable
- Ensure that budget reports are prepared and submitted to authority / committees periodically during the year with appropriate commentary on any significant variances
- Review the budget performance either during the year or at the financial year-end seeking explanations for any significant or unanticipated variances
- Ensure that the authority has considered the establishment of specific earmarked reserves and, ideally, reviews them annually as part of the budget assessment process
- Ensure that the precept in the accounts matches the submission form to the relevant authority and the public record of precepted amounts

### Interim audit

The Clerk confirmed that the budget setting process is underway with the council aiming to sign off the budget and precept figure at the council meeting in November, prior to submitting the precept request to the District Council before the end of January.

I reviewed the receipts and payments reports for the period up to 30 September. These show income received at 62.8% of budget and expenditure at 42.6% of budget.

I reviewed the nominal ledger report and found no incidents of 'off setting' of income against expenditure. All reports are accurately completed and contain sufficient explanation as to the source of each item of income and expenditure.

The council holds £10,000 in an earmarked reserve for the Cricket Field and Bury Green, with all other funds held in the general reserve.

Council is reminded that general guidance recommends a level of general reserve be maintained at circa six months equivalent of precept and this will be reviewed at the year-end audit.

## **Final Audit**

The council's year-end position reports income at 105.9% of budget and expenditure is reported as 79.4% of budget. This demonstrates that the budget was accurately set and has been carefully monitored throughout the year.

At year-end, the council held £7,500 in the Cricket Field & Bury Green EMR and £4,500 in a road signs EMR. The general reserve has increased during the year and contained £22,366 by the year-end. General guidance recommends an appropriate

level of general reserve as circa six months equivalent of precept, adjusted for local conditions. The level of general reserve held by the council equates to circa 80% of precept. This is slightly higher than normally recommended, but not unreasonable for a council of this size.

#### Section conclusion

I am of the opinion that the control objective of "The precept or rates requirement resulted from an adequate budgetary process; progress against the budget was regularly monitored; and reserves were appropriate" has been met.

## E. INCOME (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

Expected income was fully received, based on correct prices, properly recorded and promptly banked; and VAT was appropriately accounted for.

### **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Review "aged debtor" listings to ensure appropriate follow up action is in place
- Allotments: ensure that appropriate signed tenancy agreements exist, that an appropriate register of tenants is maintained identifying, that debtors are monitored.
- Burials: ensure that a formal burial register is maintained that it is up-to-date and that a sample of interments and memorials are appropriately evidenced, that fees have been charged at the correct approved rate and been recovered within a reasonable time: (Authorities should also acquire and retain copies of Burial / Cremation certificates)
- Hall hire: ensure that an effective diary system for bookings is in place identifying the hirer, hire times and ideally cross-referenced to invoices raised
- Leases: ensure that leases are reviewed in a timely manner in accordance with the terms of the lease and rents similarly reviewed appropriately at the due time
- Other variable income streams: ensure that appropriate control procedures and documentation are in existence to provide a clear audit trail through to invoicing and recovery of all such income
- Where amounts are receivable on set dates during the year, ensure that an appropriate control record is maintained duly identifying the date(s) on which income is due and actually received / banked

# Interim audit

Apart from the precept, the council has budgeted to receive income from grants, Fields in Trust, bank interest and miscellaneous income. Items of income are clearly annotated on the RBS reports and appear to have been assigned to the correct nominal codes.

## **Final Audit**

From a review of the RBS detailed information, it is clear that sufficient transactional detail continues to be provided for accounting entries and income appears to be assigned to appropriate nominal codes.

### **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control objective of "Expected income was fully received, based on correct prices, properly recorded and promptly banked; and VAT was appropriately accounted for" has been met.

## F. PETTY CASH (INTERIM AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

Petty cash payments were properly supported by receipts, all petty cash expenditure was approved and VAT appropriately accounted for.

## **Recommended minimum testing:**

- A number of authorities are now running down and closing their petty cash accounts and using debit / credit cards for ad hoc purchases. Consequently, a "not applicable" response is frequently required in this area.
- Review the systems in place for controlling any petty cash and cash floats (used for bar, catering, etc.)
- Check a sample of transactions during the financial year to ensure appropriate supporting documentation is held
- Review the existence of evidenced periodic independent verification of the petty cash and any other cash floats held
- Ensure that VAT is identified wherever incurred and appropriate
- Physically check the petty cash and other cash floats held
- Where bar or catering facilities are in place, ensure that appropriate cashing-up procedures are in place reconciling the physical cash takings to the till "Z" total readings

### Interim audit

The council has no petty cash.

## **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion the control objective of "Petty cash payments were properly supported by receipts, all petty cash expenditure was approved, and VAT appropriately accounted for" is not applicable as the council has no petty cash.

## **G. PAYROLL (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)**

### Internal audit requirement

Salaries to employees and allowances to members were paid in accordance with this authority's approvals, and PAYE and NI requirements were properly applied.

# **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Ensure that, for all staff, a formal employment contract is in place together with a confirmatory letter setting out any changes to the contract
- Ensure that appropriate procedures are in place for the payment of members allowances and deduction of any tax liability
- Ensure that, for a sample of staff salaries, gross pay due is calculated in accordance with the approved spinal point on the NJC scale or hourly rate, if off-scale, and with the contracted hours
- Ensure that appropriate tax codes are being applied to each employee
- Where free or paid for software is used, ensure that it is up to date.
- For the test sample of employees, ensure that tax is calculated appropriately
- Check the correct treatment of pension contributions to either the Local Government pension scheme (non taxable, deducted from the gross salary or DC schemes like NEST which already allow for tax deductions)
- For NI, ensure that the correct deduction and employer's contributions are applied: NB. The employers' allowance is not available to councils but may be used by other authorities
- Ensure that the correct employers' pension percentage contribution is being applied
- Ensure that for the test sample, the correct net pay is paid to the employee with tax, NI and pension contributions correctly paid to the respective agencies

# Interim audit

The council uses an external company to provide payroll services. The external provider completes all the PAYE and NI calculations and provides the information to the council to make the salary and HMRC payments. I reviewed the payslips provided for August and September 2021 and PAYE, NI and Pension deductions appear correct.

I confirmed that the Clerk has a signed contract of employment, based on the NALC model.

### **Final Audit**

I reviewed the year-end figures assigned to box 4 of the AGAR. Through discussion with the Clerk, we confirmed that these are for direct staff costs only – i.e., salaries, HMRC payments and pensions contributions.

### **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that salaries are correctly stated on the AGAR and that the control object of "Salaries to employees and allowances to members were paid in accordance with this authority's approvals, and PAYE and NI requirements were properly applied" has been met.

# H. ASSETS AND INVESTMENTS (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)

## Internal audit requirement

Asset and investments registers were complete and accurate and properly maintained.

## **Recommended minimum testing:**

# Tangible fixed assets

- Ensure that the authority is maintaining a formal asset register and updating it routinely to record new assets at historic cost price, net of VAT and removing any disposed of / no longer serviceable assets
- Physically verifying the existence and condition of high value, high risk assets may be appropriate
- Ideally, the register should identify for each asset the purchase cost and, if practicable, the replacement / insured cost, the latter being updated annually and used to assist in forward planning for asset replacement
- Additions and disposals records should allow tracking from the prior year to the current
- Ensure that the asset value to be reported in the AGAR at Section 2, Box 9 equates to the prior year reported value, adjusted for the nominal value of any new acquisitions and /or disposals
- Compare the asset register with the insurance schedule to ensure that all assets as recorded are appropriately insured or "self-insured" by the authority

## Fixed asset investments

• Ensure that all long-term investments (i.e., those for more than 12-month terms) are covered by the "Investment Strategy" and reported as Assets in the AGAR at Section 2, Box 9.

# **Borrowing and lending**

- Ensure that the authority has sought and obtained appropriate DMO approval for all loans acquired
- Ensured that the authority has accounted for the loan appropriately (i.e., recorded the full value of the loan. Any arrangement fee should be regarded as an admin expense) in the year of receipt
- Ensure that the combined principal loan repayment and interest for the year is correctly recorded in the AGAR at Section 2 Box 5
- Ensure that the outstanding loan liability as of 31st March each year is correctly recorded in the AGAR at Section 2, Box 10 (value should be verified via the DMO website)
- Where the authority has issued loans to local bodies, they should ideally seek signed indemnities from the recipient body, or their members, agreeing to underwrite the loan debt

## Interim audit

The council has a fixed asset register which is maintained in an Excel format. The register provides a description of the asset, its location, the original purchase cost, replacement value and insurance cover. The asset list appears consistent with the detail contained within the insurance schedule. This is suitable for a council with assets of this nature.

## **Final Audit**

The asset register total was checked and found to match that entered on the AGAR for 2020-21, which is the same total as the previous AGAR submission.

Loan interest and capital repayments were agreed to PWLB debt management letters and the outstanding balance was verified to the PWLB year-end balance.

### **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control objective of "Asset and investments registers were complete and accurate and properly maintained" has been met.

## I. BANK AND CASH (INTERIM AND FINAL AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

Periodic and year-end bank account reconciliations were properly carried out.

## **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Ensure that bank reconciliations are prepared routinely, are subject to independent scrutiny and sign-off by members
- Verify the accuracy of the year-end bank reconciliation detail and ensure accurate disclosure of the combined cash and bank balances in the AGAR, Section 2, Box 8
- Where the authority has bank balances in excess of £100,000 it has an appropriate investment strategy

### Interim audit

The council amended Financial Regulation 2.2 at its meeting in November 2020 to read 'On a regular basis, at each Council meeting, the RFO will present the most recent bank statements and reconciliations to the Council for approval which shall be signed by the Chair.'

I reviewed the reconciliations and associated bank statements for June, July and August. There were no errors identified and I was able to confirm the balances agreed.

## **Final Audit**

At the year-end audit date, the council had a reconciled bank position across its accounts, which I was able to verify to the bank statement for the period ended 31 March 2022. There were no outstanding payments at the year-end.

The balances held by the council are within the protection limit of the Financial Services Compensation Scheme (FSCS).

### Section conclusion

I am of the opinion that bank and cash balances are properly shown on the AGAR and that the control objective of "Periodic and year-end bank account reconciliations were properly carried out" has been met.

# J. YEAR END ACCOUNTS (FINAL AUDIT)

## Internal audit requirement

Accounting statements prepared during the year were prepared on the correct accounting basis (receipts and payments or income and expenditure), agreed to the cash book, supported by an adequate audit trail from underlying records and where appropriate debtors and creditors were properly recorded.

## **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Ensure that, where annual turnover exceeds £200,000, appropriate records are maintained throughout the year on an Income and Expenditure basis to facilitate budget reporting in that vein
- Ensure that appropriate accounting arrangements are in place to account for debtors and creditors during the year and at the financial year-end

The year-end accounts have been correctly prepared on the receipts and payments basis with no need for the box 7 & 8 reconciliation.

The AGAR correctly casts and cross casts and the comparatives have been correctly copied over from the previous year's AGAR.

The explanation of variances has been completed with detail and explanations provided for variances in excess of 15% for boxes 6, 7 and 10. I recommend adding further detail to the explanation for boxes 6 and 7 as there is currently an unexplained difference of circa £1,200 which the external auditor may need to review.

### **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control assertion "Accounting statements prepared during the year were prepared on the correct accounting basis (receipts and payments or income and expenditure), agreed to the cash book, supported by an adequate audit trail from underlying records and where appropriate debtors and creditors were properly recorded" has been met.

## Internal audit requirement

As highlighted by the External Auditor, the proper practices for publication of the notice were not followed in 20/21 as the date of the inspection notice was dated the same date as the date the Annual Governance Statement and Accounting Statements were approved.

Therefore, assertion 4 on the Annual Governance Statement should be signed as 'no' by the council. I have confirmed that the proposed timescales for 2021/22 are within the requirements of this control objective.

## **Section conclusion**

I am of the opinion that the control assertion "the authority has demonstrated that during summer 2021 it correctly provided for the exercise of public rights as required by the Accounts and Audit Regulations" has NOT been met.

I am of the opinion that the control assertion of "the authority has complied with the publication requirements for 2019/20 AGAR. Under the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015, authorities must publish the following information on the authority website / webpage" has NOT been met.

## O. TRUSTEESHIP (INTERIM AUDIT)

### Internal audit requirement

Trust funds (including charitable) – The council met its responsibilities as a trustee.

### **Recommended minimum testing:**

- Confirm that all charities of which the council is a Trustee are up to date with Charity Commission filing requirements
- that the council is the sole trustee on the Charity Commission register
- that the council is acting in accordance with the Trust deed
- that the charity meetings and accounts are recorded separately from those of the council
- review the level and activity of the charity and where a risk-based approach suggests such, review the Independent Examiner's report

### Interim audit

The council is the trustee of Squires Cottages Charity (charity number 206068). A review of the charity commission website shows that all reporting is up to date.

I am of the opinion that the control assertion of "Trust funds (including charitable) – The council met its responsibilities as a trustee" has been met.
