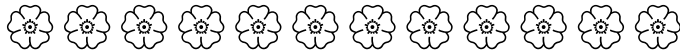

Last but not least there is one person who deserves a special mention, our longest serving member, Carol Clarke who has been the backbone of this Society attending meetings, helping set up and clear, and in the background quietly and competently making and serving teas and biscuits at our functions for over 30 years. Well done Carol.

# **EXHIBITION REGULATIONS**

- 1. All shows are to be conducted in accordance with the rules and standards of the Royal Horticultural Society Show Handbook, except where amended to meet the requirements of the Society's own Exhibition Regulations.**

**The judges' decisions are final.**

- 2. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry and in the event of refusal, it is not required to give any reason or explanation.**
- 3. All Horticultural Exhibits, unless otherwise stated in the schedule, must have been grown by the Exhibitor (including children).**

**Entries in other sections must have been made by the exhibitor and must not have been shown previously at any of the Society's shows.**

- 4. No person is to enter more than one exhibit in any one class; only one exhibitor in a household may enter any one class in Divisions A, B, C, and D.**
- 5. All entries are to be made out on the official form enclosed within the schedule or by email direct to the Show Secretary.**
- 6. No person may compete in a show unless the entry form and fee is received by the time stipulated in the schedule.**
- 7. All exhibits must be staged ready for judging by the time indicated in the schedule and late arrivals will not be accepted.**
- 8. Should any dispute arise over any matter connected with the show which is not provided for in these regulations, it shall be decided by the committee whose decision shall be final. All complaints, other than those made at the time of showing, must be made in writing.**
- 9. Exhibits may not be removed from any show until after the prize giving, unless authorised by the Secretary or other member of the committee.**
- 10. The society will not be responsible for any loss or damage to any exhibit during a show, but all ordinary care will be taken.**

## **EXHIBITION REGULATIONS (cont.)**

- 11. Pot Plants must have been owned for at least 12 months by the Exhibitor prior to the show.**
- 12. The use of Floral Foam / Oasis is not permitted in any class and any exhibit will be disqualified.**
- 13. Floral Arrangements may include flowers not grown by the Exhibitor.**
- 14. Entrance Fees:**
  - 30 PENCE for each class, at each show.**
  - Children's classes (12 years and under) : FREE.**
- 14. Points Values**
  - Points are awarded to prize winners to permit competition for annual cups and trophies, as:**
    - First .....3 Points.**
    - Second .....2 Points.**
    - Third .....1 Point.**
- 15. Definitions**
  - New Exhibitor's Section: Open to people who are in their first year of exhibition in Bury, West Burton and District Horticultural Society Shows.***
  - Open Section : Open to all members inclusive of 'New Exhibitors'.***

## **Class 53 - For the James McGee Wilcockson Trophy.**

### **Carrot Cake Recipe.**

#### **Ingredients**

225g	Self-raising Flour.
2 teaspoons	Baking Powder.
150g	Light Muscovado Sugar.
50g	Walnut Pieces, chopped.
100g	Carrots, coarsely grated.
2	Ripe Bananas, mashed.
2	Eggs.
150ml	Sunflower Oil.

Plus a topping of your choice.

#### **Method**

1. Lightly grease a 20cm (8 inch) deep round cake tin and line the base with a circle of non-stick baking parchment. Pre-heat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4.
2. Measure all the ingredients for the cake into a large bowl and mix well, until thoroughly blended. Turn the mixture into the prepared cake tin and gently level the surface.
3. Bake in the pre-heated oven for 50 – 60 minutes or until the cake is well risen, golden and beginning to shrink away from the sides of the tin and a fine skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Allow the cake to cool in the tin for a few minutes, then loosen the sides of the cake from the tin with a small palette knife, turn the cake out onto a wire rack and allow to cool completely.
4. Mix a topping of your choice and spread evenly over the top of the cake. Store in the refrigerator.

## **Showing Tips.**

Read the Schedule carefully and ensure that your entries are correct, paying particular attention to size and quantity. You cannot win a prize or gain points if it is 'Not as Schedule'.

All entries should be as fresh as possible. The judges will always look for this – flowers should be freshly cut, vegetables freshly gathered and baking freshly made. You should also consider Presentation, as this will always be taken into account.

### **Flowers and Shrubs (Division B)**

Entries should be clean, free from any damage, disease or soil. If more than one bloom is required, then all the blooms should be as equal as possible, paying particular attention to size, shape, colour and maturity.

For some flowers and shrubs, it is best to pick them on the morning of the show, removing damaged flowers, leaves and any insects. However other flowers, like Annuals and Perennials, it can be helpful to pick them the night before and keep them in a bucket of water overnight; this allows them to have a good drink and reduces the chance that they will flop over during the actual show. We would also suggest that you bring a few spare flowers, in case of an accident.

### **Vegetables (Division C)**

These are often best displayed on a plain white plate or directly on to the tables.

Entries should be fresh, clean, free from any damage, disease or soil. Uniform size is more important than actual size and quality for eating is also essential.

Rhubarb – The stems should be pulled, with the 'shoe' intact. The stems straight and all of uniform size. Leaves should be trimmed to about 60mm. Potatoes – Blemish free skins and uniform in size and shape. Carrots and Beetroot – The tops should be cut and tied at about 60mm; roots intact. Onions – They should be peeled as little as possible; the roots trimmed and tops cut and tied. Leeks – Roots and leaves should be left intact; they should be solid with no sign of 'bulbing'. Courgettes and Cucumbers – they should still have a small part of the stem attached. Lettuces – the roots should be cleaned and left intact. Tomatoes – The calyx should be still attached; uniformity of size and ripeness is very important.

### **Fruit (Division D)**

These are often best displayed on a plain white plate or directly on to the tables.

Entries should be fresh, clean, free from any damage, disease or soil. Uniform size is more important than actual size and quality for eating is also essential.

Raspberries and Loganberries – should have the calyx attached. Currants – should be left on the string.

### **Floral Art (Division E)**

Flowers may be purchased for any exhibit, however it is essential that no part of any arrangement exceeds the space allowed, both vertically and horizontally.

### **Cookery (Division F)**

The overall appearance is important, so ensure that your plate is clean. Taste is also vital, as well as texture, so make sure that your ingredients are well mixed. If a recipe is given in the Programme, please follow it carefully.

Chutneys, Jams, Jellies and Marmalade – the jars should be made of clear glass, clean and not have any ‘branded names’. If you use a jar that will take a screw top, then a new metal screw top should be used. A plain top jar should be sealed with a cellophane cover and a wax paper disc. All jars must be labelled, give the type of preserve and the date it was made. With Marmalade it is essential that the peel is correctly cooked. Jars should be filled close to the top, however with Chutneys a one centimetre gap is advisable.

### **Craft and Photography (Division G)**

Photography – Where possible it is best to have the picture titled and no larger than A4 in size. Please remember that for display purposes we may need to attach a self adhesive mount or use pins to display the pictures on boards.

Craft – Due to the nature of these classes, some items can be quite large. It would therefore be helpful, for the Show Secretary, if you can advise him/her if your entry is on the larger size, so that space can be allocated.
